

The Amelia Earhart Scholarship Fund Trustees took a flying break from reviewing this year's AE scholarship applications and visited WVI on March 28th. You have to know they are a very congenial group when all six of them were willing to squeeze into a C-210 and make the short, but crowded hop from RHV to WVI and back!

Each year in March, the AE Trustees meet to evaluate each of the scholarship applications on a rigorous set of criteria prior to sending them to the outside judges. This year they met at Debby Cunningham's house in the Los Gatos area.

The Ninety-Nines established the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund in 1940 to honor the memory of Amelia Earhart and to perpetuate her ideals and love of flying. From a single scholarship of \$125 in 1941, the annual Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund has grown to help over 400 women from six countries to advance and succeed in aviation and aerospace. Currently, the fund has surpassed four million dollars, establishing itself as a marvelous legacy to the women who had the foresight to create the fund in 1940. The number of scholarships given based is on the return on investment of the fund.



Amazon has a new charitable donation program, Amazon Smile that allows customers to designate .5 % of their Amazon purchases to their charity of choice. We have registered the 99s as one of the charities eligible for the new donation program and hope you will help support the 99s by designating the 99s as your charity of choice for future Amazon purchases. Here is all you have to do::

- 1. Visit <u>www.smile.amazon.com</u>, and bookmark the page for future use.
- 2. Sign in using your usual Amazon account.
- 3. When prompted to choose a charitable organization, choose the Ninety-Nines Inc. (Oklahoma City) from the list of eligible charities in the other field.
- 4. A percentage of each Amazon purchase you make when entering the Amazon site through www.smile.amazon.com will be donated to the 99s.



The best way to remember is to bookmark the site or save it on your home screen. For Windows 7, you can save the page to your favorites by going to the page and using ctrl-d and saving it to favorites. Or when your are on the Amazon smile page, left click on the little Amazon icon to the left of the URL in Internet Explorer and chose pin to task bar. You can leave it on your task bar or drag it to your desktop. For the iPad, go to the Amazon smile page, tap the action button to the left of the URL (looks like an arrow escaping from a rectangle), and tap add bookmark. Once you have bookmarked Amazon Smile, you will find that clicking on the the Amazon smile icon will take you quickly to the Amazon site, even more quickly than typing amazon.com in your browser!

We plan to use the proceeds from the Amazon Smile donation to support a "New Pilot" initiative we are developing and increase our presence and participation at aviation events. AOPA has replaced the single national Aviation Summit with a series of 6 regional events, thereby significantly increasing our participation costs. Amazon Smile will provide support for our presence at these events where we hope to reach out to new and student pilots and share with them our enthusiasm for flight and the 99s. Inspired by the success of the AEMSF new "Fly Now" Scholarships, our increased presence will enable us to reach out to student pilots and women who are interested in learning to fly and tell them about the 99s and the scholarship opportunities available to them through the Ninety-Nines and the Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund.

Maneuvering Flight

Mark: "Bob, most pilots understand the risks of maneuvering flight. So why should we even spend time talking about it?"



Bob: "Well Mark, I've always been a student of aircraft accidents, and my rationale is very simple. We're not remotely creative in general aviation flying. We just keep doing the same dumb stuff over and over again. So until such time as we take some positive action to change the state of affairs, looking at where we've been is a pretty good indication of what we can expect in the near future."

Mark: "What do the numbers say, Bob? Is maneuvering flight causing a lot of accidents?"

Bob: "Well Mark, the Nall Report, produced yearly by the Air Safety Foundation, is an excellent state of the union for general aviation. The 2006 report, which analyzes the 2005 accidents, made for some fascinating reading; they had some very distressing facts.

Maneuvering flight accounted for 1/3 of all the fatalities. For single engine fixed-gear airplanes, the percentage of fatal maneuvering accidents jumped dramatically from 29 percent in 2004, to 39 percent in 2005. And Mark, in my experience with years at the FAA, these observations just continually bore themselves out. They were far too many, they were always tragic in nature, and they're absolutely avoidable."

Mark: "When we talk about maneuvering flight, Bob, what kind of flying are we talking about"

Bob: "Well Mark, the definition used by the Air Safety Foundation for the purposes of this report, include the following areas of flight: aerobatics, low passes, buzzing, pull-ups, aerial application maneuvers, a turn to reverse direction (as in a box canyon-type maneuver), or engine failure after take-off when the pilot tries to return to the runway.

Mark, and when you think about it, let's take a look at all the good reasons there are to be operating an aircraft close to the ground. You know what? Other than landing, I can't think of any. Remember, I said we're talking about good reasons for operating close to the ground."
