

When they had their fly-out to the Monterey Airport, our members went there and joined them for a lunch along with stories of flying and meeting some of their interesting members. The ladies came from three different airports. When we had the air marking at the Hollister Airport, Bay Cities had about 7 of their members helped out. Last month, they were celebrating their 90th anniversary as a chapter at the Oakland Aviation Museum. Michaele and I joined them. Sometimes when our chapter seems a bit flat, we can always piggy back onto another chapter's event and have fun that way. Keep your eyes open for such opportunities and participate when you can. It's always fun when you can talk aviation and meet like-minded women aviators.

Encountering a helium filled Mylar balloon during flight. Observing a balloon that has just been released slowly take flight into the air, one doesn't think how the characteristics change once that balloon is airborne. At high altitudes, where air pressure decreases, the helium inside the balloon increases and expands the balloon to a point when it pops. Upon doing an internet search, one research group tracked a helium filled balloon up to 29,537 feet before it popped.

While flying around 3,000 feet, I observed a silver speck on the horizon and within minutes I realized it was a Mylar filled helium balloon coming right toward my plane at a very fast speed. I had just seconds to turn the nose away from the balloon as it whizzed past me. I had no idea that a balloon could move that fast! When I was on the ground I let my imagination wander a bit to the question of "What would happen if the balloon popped and blocked the air intake?" My friend Petra and other pilots have told me it's like winning the lottery; almost impossible that such an occurrence could happen. Anything from a bird strike to other objects blocking the air intake would affect the internal combustion engine and any air flow. It would be an emergency descent & 7700.

Mylar and helium filled balloons are a menace for pilots and for the environment. In a recent article in the Santa Cruz Sentinel it identified some of the problems such as choke and entanglement situations when wildlife encounter the balloons. Also tie offs, clips and strings from a freed balloon are serious issues when wildlife mistakes them for food. I was on a whale watching boat enjoying the ocean and observing the whales, dolphins, and leatherback turtle. Everyone spotted something red bobbing in between the waves. It was a red balloon. It was amazing how quickly my boat and another boat communicated with each other to decide who was going to retrieve the balloon. Balloons are a serious issue so when you can, please educate whenever you can the dangers of balloons both in the water, land, and in the sky.

Air Time

The Salinas airport is entering the 21st century with potential commercial flights and unmanned aircraft.

magine you're flying into Monterey Regional Airport and the runway is fogged in, and instead of your plane being diverted to Fresno, Bakersfield or San Jose, it could instead land in Salinas.

And imagine that you land at San Jose or San Francisco and need to get to Monterey County, and instead of driving on a road, you can travel in an electric, unmanned vertical takeoff and landing aircraft—called eVTOL, in industry lingo.

That's the vision in mind for the Salinas Municipal Airport, which is going through an update to its master plan, last revised in 2004.

Airport Manager Brett Godown presented the Salinas City Council with the vision for the master plan update on March 8, explaining how he and his staff are seeking to modernize the airport and make it more of an asset going forward. The only councilmember expressing reservations was Anthony Rocha, who cited

a recent, peer-reviewed study at two airports in Santa Clara County that found elevated amounts of lead in the air. (Both airports have since shifted to strictly unleaded fuel for aircraft.)

"I wasn't hearing much about these environmental justice concerns happening at other airports," Rocha says.

"I would love to fly out of Salinas, that would be amazing."

Godown welcomes that feedback—"We need those checks and balances for someone to hold us accountable," he says.

One potential project is a runway expansion; currently, the Salinas Airport's two runways are not long enough to accommodate Monterey's fleet, Godown says. The longest runway in Salinas is 6,000 feet, and he estimates it would need to be lengthened to 7,000 feet. Further study is required to hone in on the exact min-

imum length.

Mayor Kimbley Craig expressed excitement about that possibility: "I would love to fly out of Salinas, that would be amazing."

The vision, Godown says, is not to compete with the Monterey Regional for commercial traffic, but to be a viable backup option if fog delays landings and takeoffs in MRY.

"We want to play our part in the region, but that requires us to do significant analysis of whether we can accept the fleet that comes into Monterey," Godown says, both from a financial and environmental standpoint.

Another prospective development is a research and development facility at the airport for eVOTL aircraft. Already, eVOTL testing is happening at the airport now by a Silicon Valley startup, Archer. That was precipitated, Godown says, after he and some

fellow staff members traveled to Silicon Valley about three years ago and met with executives from Boeing and Airbus, telling them about the opportunities Salinas offers. Some of those executives from Airbus went on to form Archer—an eVTOL startup—and later came knocking.

Godown says Salinas is the "perfect place" for such testing for a host of reasons: Its proximity to the Bay Area and Santa Cruz, and the fact that south of the airport is miles of unpopulated agricultural fields. And there's also mountains, and sea nearby. "You get all the geographic and atmospheric [elements] to prove the aircraft," he says.


Godown says public meetings will be held throughout the planning process. While the final draft plan likely won't be done until fall of 2023, "the idea is to incrementally release portions when they're finished." *

Subject: Salinas Airport Administration Offices Moving

Dear Airport Tenants, Businesses, and Associates:

I wanted to provide you with a rather significant update regarding airport administration, operations, and maintenance (AOM) activities. In the coming months, AOM will be relocating and consolidating from 10 locations/facilities to 2. For many years, AOM activities have been spread throughout the airport. The AOM functions will be relocating to 342 Airport Blvd (the old Mosquito Abatement Facility). As of this week, Airport Staff began relocating maintenance activities. We are hopeful maintenance activities will be fully relocated by the end of April. We estimate the Airport Administration and Operation staff will relocate around mid-May. The administration move is fully contingent on setting up the City Network within the new facility.

The City will maintain the 30 Mortensen Ave mailing address for several months and provide several updates and notifications when we transition to the new mailing address. If you have been attending the pilot Association (SPA) meetings, or the monthly safety and security meetings, we have discussed this transition since January 2022.

The number one question we receive is, what are we going to do with the City Facilities that we will be vacating? We are going to rent out most of the spaces.

The second question we receive is, did the City buy the new building? No, in January 2020, the Mosquito Abatement District quitclaimed the building to the City at zero cost to the City. The quitclaim was a condition of the lease being offered to the District.

As we get closer to the Administration and Operation move, we will publicize more information and hopefully do an open house after we are settled in.


