UPDATES ON OUR STUDENT PILOTS

SOPHIA TAYLOR-HOME

Some interesting news about her is that she is getting closer to soloing in gliders out of Hollister and passed the FAA written exam for gliders in late November. She is still taking lessons, (though really infrequently right now because of school) in powered flight out of Monterey.

She is continuing to apply for flight training scholarships as they come up. She was recently elected to the Board of Directors of SOPA, and also to the Board of Directors of EAA 119 in Watsonville.

KATRINA ESPINOZA

Katrina is extremely busy with academics, flying and Civil Air Patrol. I told her I would answer your email. Carolgene has been faithfully calling us every month for updates and

over the past three months, we have informed her that Katrina is receiving flight instruction at Aerodynamic Aviation in San Jose (Reid Hillview Airport). Her primary flight instructor Lynzie Hudson, is the treasurer of the Oakland 99s. After independent stage check evaluations by Chief and Deputy Chief flight instructors Jen Watson and Jason Brown (this is standard practice at Aerodynamic) which she passed with flying colors, she soloed out of Reid Hillview in September 2017 and is now in the process of completing her cross country requirements. Up until early December, she has been flying 2 times a week, on average and has about 50+ flight hours under her belt.

In addition to her flying activities, she earned her Amelia Earhart award in Civil Air Patrol, promoting to the rank of Captain this past summer and has been the Cadet Commander of the John J. Montgomery Squadron (Squadron 36) since April 2017, except for 2 months when she allowed a lower ranking cadet the experience of commanding the squadron before he aged out of the cadet program. She is the highest ranking cadet in her squadron. She spent the last week of December and a couple of days in January (yes, she spent New Year's away from her family) completing the Cadet Officers Basic Course in Camp Parks, Dublin and finished 6th from the top in a class of 40. She likewise excels academically, being an AP Scholar and although only a high school junior, is now taking all college classes, some in Cabrillo and the rest AP.

As you can imagine, keeping up this level of performance requires a lot of time and effort on her part. Remember too that she is now gearing up for college applications, preparing for her SAT/ACT, researching colleges and trying to finalize her choice of college major, not to mention getting ready for the AP exams in May. So until the end of this semester, please address all your requests for updates to me, so as not to overwhelm Katrina. I am planning to ride along for her night cross country. UPDATES ON OUR STUDENT PILOTS

DEMI BAMBER

This journey in aviation has been challenging, beautiful, empowering, and everything in between.

I started in a 1946 J3 Piper Cub learning stick and rudder skills out of KSNS and KKIC, in September 2016. As it was my mission to complete all requirements for PPL, I had to break way from the J3 to a Cessna to complete hood and night training.

Currently I fly the J3 on a regular basis to build time and skill.

The J3 is not properly equipped for a check ride so I will be renting a C152 and going over all I have learned in the J3, so that I can become proficient and do a check ride in that aircraft.

Since the start I have been fortunate enough to experience a great deal of safety, spin, and stall recovery training. I have been saturated with safety flight training, and with maintenance. This has been great for pilot confidence as well as understanding aerodynamics and safety on a fundamental level. Because of the team I have been surrounded by I have been able to gain a very important foundation that I wish ALL student pilots to experience.

Through this journey I have come to truly understand the importance of mentors, teachers, and community. I believe that the foundation I have begun to build will allow me to become a teacher and mentor to others in the future. This particular idea plays a huge role in what motivates me through this journey.

I am dedicated to build hours and keep the momentum so that once I earn my pilot certificate I immediately begin my tasks for commercial certificate. Aviation is still fairly new to me so as I have pushed forward I have seen 'doors' I didn't now existed. I have had a few different types of flying I found great interest in. I am currently looking at steps necessary to fly corporate. Aerobatics will always be something I pursue because of



the knowledge and safety required. If I could find a way in my future to give student pilots the opportunity to do upset recovery training, I believe a positive impact could be made for the safety of many individuals.



In 1998 the Monterey Bay Chapter of the Ninety-Nines began an Aviation Scholarship. The purpose of this scholarship was to encourage local Monterey Bay area women to learn to fly or advance their skills in aviation. Since 1998 the chapter has funded this scholarship each year.

For 2017 we are proud to add Demi Bamber to the list of Monterey Bay 99s recipients. Her professional and aviation affiliations are Team Oracle, and Tutima Academy of Aviation Safety.

When Demi was asked for an update on her flying activities, this is her response along with some photos.

“My current flying status- I will begin renting a 152 hourly for instruction next week, this will be the same aircraft I take my check ride in.

I am switching to an aircraft that I can use for the check ride (cannot use the J3).

When I am not flying this, I will be flying the J3 cub to continue building time (for commercial) as well as stick and rudder skills.

I have met all hourly requirements and now it is time to learn this Cessna, solo it, become proficient, and take a check ride in it! I am absolutely thrilled!

This scholarship will provide an immense amount of relief. I am overjoyed.”

Congratulations to Demi. Even more important is a heartfelt “Thank you” to the Monterey Bay Chapter members for their commitment and energy that goes into continuing this tradition.
