



1) General Aviation and Density Altitude Notice Number: NOTC1281

Trivia question: What is the temperature for a "Standard" day in Albuquerque, NM? **Answer:** Would you believe about 40°F! And when was the last day this year that Albuquerque had a temperature of 40°F? April 28 at 3:59 a.m. The next "Standard" day may not be until October. The article about General Aviation and Density Altitude, which you can find at this link: https://faasafety.gov/files/notices/2008/Jul/GASafety and DAlt.pdf is written by pilots/engineers, so it gives some great insight into the problems we face as General Aviation pilots pertaining to density altitude. We invite you to read and ponder this article before you plan your next flight this summer.

2) Fires affect dozens of CA airports — By AOPA ePublishing staff

With about 1,000 separate fires burning in Northern California, dozens of airports and hundreds of miles of airspace have been affected. Pilots who don't need to traverse the affected areas are urged to avoid them, leaving airspace, air traffic controllers, and radio frequencies available for fire-related operations.

U.S. Forest Service officials report that extremely smoky conditions have kept many aircraft on the ground, but large numbers of aircraft have been assembled at airports near the fires, ready to fly as soon as conditions permit. Unmanned aircraft, including NASA's Ikhana and the Northrup Grumman Global Hawk operated by the Air Force, are among the aircraft being used to track and take images of the fires. These unmanned aircraft are launched and recovered within existing restricted areas and operate above Flight Level 180, so they do not affect most general aviation operations. Meanwhile, temporary towers have been installed at some airports, including McClellan Airfield in Sacramento and Siskiyou County in Montague, to help manage firefighting activities. Pilots who must fly anywhere in the Northern California area are urged to check notams frequently, as temporary flight restrictions are continuously being activated and changed as conditions dict-tate. More than 140 fires are burning in Mendocino County alone, and at one point aviation officials considered putting a TFR over the entire county—the state's largest and home to about 15 airports. Officials ultimately decided to use multiple smaller TFRs, but their status and location can change at any time. 3) FLY CLEAR of WILDFIRES Notice Number: NOTC1266

For your safety and the safety of our aerial firefighters, please stay at least five nautical miles from the smoke. Report suspicious smoke to the nearest flight service station. Check NOTAM's prior to every flight! 1-800-WX BRIEF/1-800-992-7433 Restriction size may vary with every incident. Even a single small fire could already have firefighting aircraft on scene. 4) System Approach for Safety Oversight (SASO) on the Web and in the News Notice Number: NOTC1280

Over the next four years, the SASO program is leading preparations to implement a Safety Assurance System (SAS) that will constitute one step in our process toward meeting ICAO's SMS mandates. To share current, comprehensive information about the status of the SASO program, the FAA's SASO Program Office has launched a new, enhanced Web site. 5) NASA Aviation Safety Reporting System (ASRS) Notice Number: NOTC1254

NASA Aviation Safety Reporting System (ASRS): An Integral Part of Your Safety Management System adapted from the NASA ASRS website. The ASRS is a small but important facet of the collaborative effort by the FAA, industry, and individuals to maintain and improve aviation safety. NASA collects voluntarily submitted aviation safety incident/situation reports for the FAA from pilots, controllers, flight attendants, mechanics, dispatchers and others. The ASRS acts on the information these reports contain. It identifies system deficiencies, and issues alerting messages to persons in a position to correct them, for example, regulatory agencies and manufacturers. It educates through its newsletter *CALLBACK*, its journal *ASRS Directline* and through its research studies. The ASRS database is a public repository which serves the FAA and NASA's needs and those of other organizations worldwide which are engaged in research and the promotion of safe flight. ASRS data is used to: A) Identify deficiencies and discrepancies in the National Aviation System (NAS) so that these can be remedied by appropriate authorities. B) Support policy formulation and planning for, and improvements to, the NAS. C) Strengthen the foundation of aviation human factors safety research. This is particularly important since it is generally conceded that over two-thirds of all aviation accidents and incidents have their roots in human performance errors.

You can also visit the new ASRS website and check out their online database and Electronic Report submission portal, or read *CALLBACK* online. ASRS received over 45,000 reports from Pilots, Controllers, Mechanics and Flight Attendants last year. You can search the database, which is a great capability and helps us to learn from other system agent's experiences. ASRS is the cornerstone of an effective safety management system. Quality reporting enables valid safety risk assessments. From there, safety assurance and promotion activities follow. Callback is a feedback mechanism that forms the foundation of a vibrant personal aviation safety program. Consider it part of your monthly safety recurrent.
