

DUATS discontinued

As you may be aware, the FAA will discontinue the Direct User Access Terminal Service (DUATS II) Program on May 16, 2018. On that date, the AOPA Flight Planner, AOPA GO and other flight planning tools will no longer have the ability to brief or file via CSRA DUATS. Users should transition to using 1800WxBrief (Leidos Flight Service) for briefings and filing on or before May 16th to eliminate possible disruptions. Both the AOPA Flight Planner and AOPA GO are fully integrated with 1800WxBrief. The online AOPA Flight Planner provides an interactive, graphical briefing and can send flight plans to 6 of the top EFB apps on the market. New Leidos Flight Service accounts can be created for free from within the AOPA Flight Planner or AOPA GO. Instructions are provided below for linking existing Leidos accounts or creating new Leidos accounts from within the AOPA Flight Planning Tools:

Existing Leidos Flight Service Account (1800WxBrief):

If you have an existing Leidos Flight Service account, enter the email address associated with that account in the Pilot Info section of the AOPA Flight Planner or AOPA GO. You may be asked to add AOPA as an authorized service provider in your account information on the 1800WxBrief website (1800wxbrief.com). After entering your email address as noted above, additional instructions will be provided if provider authorization is required.

Create a New Leidos Flight Service Account (1800WxBrief):

If you do not have an existing account with Leidos Flight Service, enter the email address you would like to use for setting up a new account in the Pilot Info section of the AOPA Flight Planner or AOPA GO. You will be asked to provide some additional information to finish setting up your account and will receive an email from Leidos Flight Service upon completion that verifies your new account was created successfully. No further authorization will be required when setting up a new 1800WxBrief account.

Bessie Coleman and the women pilots history shouldn't forget

(CNN) — Bessie Coleman broke multiple barriers when she took flight in 1921, and became the first African -American woman to earn a pilot's license.

Jan. 26, 2017 Google Doodle commemorates the 125th anniversary of her birth. Coleman was among a small group of female aviators in the early 20th century who successfully flew around the detours of racial prejudice and sexism to become queens in the air.

Worldwide, only 3 percent of airline pilots are women, the <u>Royal Aeronautical Society</u> said last November.

Recently, there's a move to change that.

The obvious place to begin is by highlighting the achievements of those long-forgotten -- the women who ignored the men who scorned them, broke through the restrictions society placed on them, and paved the way for Amelia Earhart.

Bessie Coleman set her sights high when she left rural Texas in her 20s. She moved to Chicago and worked as a manicurist, but it was her brothers' stories from World War I that piqued her interest in flying. They'd make jokes about how French women were better than African-American women because they could fly. Those taunts became inspiration, but flight schools in the US denied her entry because of her race and gender, according to the Smithsonian.

Very few American women of any race had pilot's licenses by 1918, but those who did were often white and rich. Undeterred, she learned French and moved to Paris. In 1921, Coleman became the <u>first female pilot of African-American and Native-American descent</u>.

Upon her return to the US she still faced discrimination and found work barnstorming, according the Chicago Defender newspaper. As a stunt pilot she dazzled crowds as she parachut-

ed from planes and performed aerial tricks. The pioneering daredevil was given the nickname "Queen Bessie."

She <u>died at 34</u> in 1926 during a practice run with another pilot. <u>About 10 minutes into the flight</u>, as they were doing a dive, the engine stopped working and Coleman fell from the plane. While she never fulfilled her dream to open a flight school for future black pilots, Coleman's imprint on aviation history lives on.

Aviators' stories still unfolding

More than 100 years after Harriet Quimby broke down barriers as the first woman to earn a pilot certificate, there are still very few women who choose flying as a career.

Here is one of them, whose story researcher and author <u>Laurie Notaro</u> dug up for her book, <u>Crossing</u> the Horizon.

Miss America of Aviation: Ruth Elder

Ruth Elder was known for her beauty and acting, but her real dream was to become the female version of transatlantic aviator Charles Lindbergh.

Newspapers at the time loved to describe her as 'the pretty American girl' who refused to give up her dream of flying from New York to Paris.

Elder refused to disguise herself as a man to become a pilot. Her popular hairstyle was known as 'Ruth Ribbons.'

A woman out of her time, she even put flying above marriage.

"Her husband complained that she devoted all her attention to aviation and none to her home," <u>reported The Scotsman in 1930</u>.





But

mechanical problems caused her monoplane, and dream, to crash in her last attempt on October 11, 1927.

She survived, floating in the Atlantic Ocean, 360 miles from land before she was rescued. At the time, it was the longest flight ever made by a woman.

"I knew if the venture succeeded it would lift me from obscurity. If it failed, and I went down, it would only be another useless life lost," Elder told the <u>Sunday Mail.</u>

Her name, while often overlooked, will forever linked to the title "Miss America of Aviation".

In years past, Watsonville Airport Open House events have showcased the value, viability and vitality of our airport with a focus on the aviation assets that support the city, community and county.

This year we will continue that tradition as law enforcement aviation assets from the California Highway Patrol and Santa Cruz County Sheriff will display their aircraft. Additionally air ambulance Calstar and the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) will bring aircraft to the field.

No airport open house would be complete without a display of based aircraft. Watsonville Municipal tenants are encouraged to display personal, flying club, trainers and corporate aircraft.

This year's Open House will include formation flyovers, food trucks/vendors and, given the later start, an early evening performance of "The Beast" a Jet Dragster powered by a Westinghouse J34 jet engine. This performance will be followed by a fireworks display. In accordance with our "openhouse" format walk-in admission is free. Vehicles may park on the crosswind runway for \$10.00.


