Why Are There So Few Women Pilots?

A Comparative Case Study of Women Pilots in United States and Indian Aviation

by Caitlyn Keeve, '20

This investigation interrogates four variables that may explain why women are outnumbered by men in the pursuit of pilot licenses and careers. Those factors include: (1) workforce safety; (2) the impact of gender-role stereotypes; (3) access to Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) training; and (4) professional support. This paper demonstrates that the existing arena for women in aviation is slowly improving, though the underrepresentation of women of color remains an issue. A comparative methodology was used to examine if the United States is a strong supporter of women pilots, while considering areas of growth through an international lens.



About the Author

CAITLYN KEEVE, is an Honors Scholar and a junior pursuing a bachelor's degree in psychology at Mount Saint Mary's University. She serves as the inaugural student ambassador for the Center for

the Advancement of Women. In her role, she works to engage students in gender equity initiatives through innovative programming, social media, and outreach on both campuses. Under the advisement of Dr. Archer, Caitlyn's honors thesis and *Collectif* piece are comparative analyses of women pilots internationally.

Gertrude "Tommy" Tompkins—WASP

Discovery Channel's Expedition Unknown Season 6 Episode 8 "America's Lost WWII Hero" aired 5/22/19. The search for what happened to Gertrude "Tommy" Tompkins 75 years ago, the only WASP lost who has never been accounted for was explored by Josh Gates who also interviewed WASP Nell Bright.

Josh Gates takes on a historical and emotional journey and heads to Los Angeles in search of the truth of the whereabouts of Women's Airforce Service Pilot (WASP) pilot Gertrude "Tommy" Tompkins. She was a striking brunette whose plane went missing after take off in Los Angeles during World War II.

What we know is that she was a stunner, accomplished, smart and recently married before she served her country.



Gates explores this intriguing case of the only lost WASP whose remains were never found. During World War II in 1944, Gertrude "Tommy" Tompkins was flying from California to New Jersey when her plane went missing. Josh joins search teams using cutting-edge technology to bring the lost hero home.

"All told 38 WASP Air Force pilots died in service. Tommy is the only one still unaccounted for."

She was part of an elite group of women, Air Force Service Pilots codenamed the WASPs which was formed at the height of World War II. They were America's only all-female squadron who tested and transported planes and carried cargo and also ran simulated missions.

Now the renewed interest is strong, as it is the 75th anniversary of her disappearance. One of the nation's leading aircraft archaeologists has retraced her flight path and found a new search zone in the mountains and a team of ocean explorers is using the latest scanning technology to pinpoint an entirely different search zone beneath the waves.

Gates adds, "On October 26, 1944, Tompkins took off from Los Angeles in a legendary P-51 Mustang. Soon after she flew into a fog bank and has been missing ever since."

Who was "Tommy" Tompkins?

According to <u>historians</u>, Gertude "Tommy" Tompkins was born in 1912, the third of three daughters in a well-to-do family. She also had a speech impediment and wound up earning her undergraduate degree from the Pennsylvania School of Horticulture.

A wonderful fact, according to historians who interviewed her family, is that Gertrude Tompkins became a WASP and never stuttered again.

Personal Minimums

According to the FAA...
Personal minimums are an individual's set of operating criteria, procedures, rules, or guidelines used to assist that individual in making personal flight decisions.

A conversation with my flight instructor recently came up regarding my personal minimums. In this case we were taking off from the Watsonville Airport, traffic pattern is 1200' (1163' actual) MSL. He asked me what I would do if there was an emergency and I was at 1,000'. Chances of making a 180 degree back to the airport would not be possible. At that point I should be preparing to make an emergency landing.

By having a personal minimum, it is a tool to determine a go or no-go to fly. All pilots should have and know what their personal minimums are. Here is an

acronym that applies to a pilot's ability to make safe flights...PAVE (pilot, aircraft, environment, external pressure.

P = Pilot. It is meant for the pilot to review their readiness for the intended flight. What is the pilot's total experience? Recent experience? Current level of proficiency? And legal requirements?

A = Aircraft. What are the hazards or risks associated with the aircraft as they pertain to the intended flight? What are the fuel requirements, including fuel reserve to make the flight? What is the overall condition of the aircraft? Is it equipped properly and legally for the intended flight? How experienced are you, the pilot, with this aircraft, especially if it is a rental? Have you flown it recently? Do you understand the operation of all electronic equipment on board?

V = **Environment.** Have you, the pilot, obtained a good weather briefing and understood the potential for environment risks along your route of flight? These risks include knowledge of both the departure and destination airports, runway conditions, terrain, obstacles, surrounding airspace, and most importantly, the weather elements that may be encountered during the flight, including winds aloft. If flying VFR, c an you maintain VFR conditions throughout the length of the flight?

E = **External Pressures.** Personal, family, and work pressures can significantly influence your level of proficiency and your ability to make and abide by good decisions.

When establishing your own personal minimums, be honest with yourself and jot down what you're comfortable with. When did you last fly and how often do you fly? What are the ceilings, visibility, and wind limits that you're comfortable with? When was the last time you flew the aircraft you're about to fly? Are there any outside influences that may affect your flight proficiency today or any future day?

The FAA's personal minimum guide is available online. Type "FAA guidelines for personal minimums" The above notes were taken from the article "Personal Minimums" by Steve Krog in the March 2019 EAA Sports Aviation magazine.

UPDATE

Construction work with Runway closures will resume next week (6/3-6/7). Runway 13-31 will be seal coated and re-painted next week (starting June 3). The ILS will be out of service for the entire Runway 13/31 closure period. Runway 08/26 will be available the entire week except for the nighttime closure period Tuesday night.

RWY 13-31 CLOSURE:

6/3/19 (Monday) 0700 – 6/6/19 (Thursday) 2200

RWY 8-26 CLOSURE (Nighttime):

6/4/19 (Tuesday) 1900 – 6/5/19 (Wednesday) 0500

General Schedule of Work:

6/3: Striping removal, crack routing & prep, seal coat test strips

6/4: Friction testing, crack seal, seal coat application, night time runway intersection work

6/5: Seal coat, striping, striping in intersection on pull back

6/6: TWY D (east of RWY 13/31) mill & pave, striping of 13-31

6/7: IF NECESSARY, finish striping

NOTICE! AIRPORT RUNWAY and TAXIWAY SIGNAGE UPDATE

PHASE THREE BEGINS July 8th TEMPORARY RUNWAY and TAXIWAY CLOSURES July 8th thru August 2nd 0700-1900 weekdays

As per Order 5100.38D Section 3-19, Consultation with Airport Users, the Watsonville Municipal Airport has previously noted receipt of an Airport Improvement Program Grant funds for the installation and upgrade of Airfield Guidance Signs and Runway 2 REILs.

While this notification does not require users to provide input or agree with the proposed projects, the airport is providing thirty (30) day notice of the following runway and taxiway closures for the installation of Signage and Runway End Identifier Lights:

July 8th - July 12th: RWY 2-20 closed 0700 to 1900 local; RWY 9-27 open

July 15th - July 19th: Intermittent closures RWY 2-20 0700 to 1900 local; RWY 9-27 open

July 22nd - August 2nd intermittent runway and taxiway closures

Project Date: Installation is scheduled to begin July 8, 2019 and conclude no later than August 2, 2019, weather permitting as depicted in this schedule.

Impacts: Installation time is estimated at four weeks. Per schedule the Guidance Signage and Runway End Identifier lighting installation will be day time only with intermittent runway closures, most likely requiring back-taxi operations. At least one runway will be open during the installation. The Watsonville Localizer approach will be out of service from July 8th until August 2nd.

Project Cost: \$350,000.00 with 90% funding through FAA Airport Improvement Grant.




