FREEZING RAIN: HOW DOES THAT HAPPEN?


How Freezing Rain Forms

According to the FAA, freezing rain is created when snow falls through a warm layer, then through a sub-zero layer of air. This temperature profile is known as a temperature inversion. Looking at the diagram below, there are three basic layers of air in this scenario. A below-freezing layer aloft, an above-freezing layer in the middle, and another below-freezing layer of air at the surface.

As the melted drops exit the middle (above-freezing) layer and fall through the lower-freezing layer, they move so quickly that they don't have time to completely freeze before they get to the ground.

So what happens to these cold water drops? They become supercooled, creating a significant icing risk to aircraft. What is supercooling though?


Supercooling is a state where a liquid is below freezing but isn't a solid (in this case, ice), meaning that as the droplets fall through the atmosphere they can't crystalize. But when supercooled droplets impact the surface of your aircraft, they stick and freeze.



Why Are Supercooled Large Droplets Dangerous?

Large drops, like you'd expect with freezing rain, can form a heavy glaze on your airframe (clear ice) that can be difficult to remove, especially if ice forms aft of de-icing equipment. Clear ice can also be hard to see because of its smooth, transparent appearance.



TAILWHEEL OVER THE BAY

Once you finish your private pilots license, what do you do next? During my interview with Pilot Beth Welliver, we see the limited possibilities to fly different aircraft locally as well as the challenges of learning a new airframe.



Flying the Luscombe over KSNS

-What inspired you to start your aviation journey?

I've been curious about flying ever since college (graduated from the Air Force Academy in 2002), but never had the time to learn. During COVID, I found myself with a little more flexibility in my schedule (for a few months I didn't spend the regular two hours each day I'd spent commuting to Morgan Hill for work), and decided I needed to explore a new hobby. Once I started doing a few lessons, I was hooked!

-What are your current hours?

I'm still a baby pilot, only 125 hours!

-What are your short-term aviation goals?

Continue to build hours and most importantly, proficiency. Flying out of Salinas, I know that an instrument rating is going to be valuable to ensure I can regularly fly, especially with my schedule....I have a busy job with a good amount of international travel, and a five-year-old who loves sports...I can't always dart off to the airport when the skies are clear and the winds are calm!

This year I'd like to get tailwheel proficient and also work toward a high-performance endorsement. Along the way, I'd also build up the cross-country hours required for my instrument rating...that rating my 2024 goal.

-What are your long-term aviation goals?

Someday, I want to own a Cessna 180 and explore all the airports in California. We have friends in Oregon and family in Washington, and would love to take some long weekends to visit them, too...so many airports with camping available to explore! And hopefully get my son excited about aviation.



-How are the tailwheel opportunities in Monterey Bay?

To be honest, I didn't know that there were any good options for learning tailwheel at either KSNS or KMRY until Sophia told me about North Aero and introduced me to Erick Teeters. Before that time, I'd been on a wait list with Aerodynamic Aviation to learn at Reid-Hillview (KRHV) for over a year.

I can't say enough about North Aero and Erick as an instructor. The Luscombe I'm learning in is fun to fly, and well maintained. Add in a patient instructor with a light-hearted coaching style and its a blast!

-What are the main differences between the tailwheel plane and the other aircraft you've flown?

The first difference is the stark contrast in how the plane maneuvers on the ground vs. a tricycle gear plane. Heavy rudder inputs during taxi, with turns feeling very different.

On takeoff, the first few times I pushed the stick forward while still on the ground in order to get the tail off the tarmac was a strange sensation and felt like a really weird attitude in which to put the plane, but i got used to that fairly quickly.





On landing, you have two options – the three point landing, and the wheel landing. Three point landings are not unlike landing a tricycle gear plane; success comes from carefully managing speed on final (no flaps to help out!), though you really have to be ready for far more rudder input once on the ground. The wheel landing (landing on the front two wheels and as the plane slows, the tailwheel settles down) is a bigger challenge to learn...flying down through ground effect and essentially flying the plane right onto the ground is a very different sensation than what I was taught to flare / round out in ground effect when landing a tricycle gear. But, every time I get the wheel landing right, I feel like a real (badass?) pilot! In the air, its a plane like any other plane. Keeping it coordinated takes some practice, and you're always on the controls with little corrections, but its pretty straightforward at that point.

-In your opinion, what is the most challenging task when flying taildraggers?

You are ALWAYS actively flying the plane. I feel like there are moments in an 172 or the Warrior in which you can level out, set a heading, and the plane will more or less fly itself with little input. In the Luscombe, there's always a sensation you need to pay attention to, and be active on the controls, especially rudder inputs!

-How has the 99s impacted your aviation journey?

I'm incredibly grateful to Sophia for introducing me to Erick. I had no intention of getting my tailwheel endorsement right away, but after flying together once in North Aero's Piper Warrior, he suggested trying the Luscombe. If Sophia hadn't made this connection for me, I never would have even known such an accessible option existed for me! I also have to thank Kay and Michaele for regularly checking in, commenting on my different aviation posts on Instagram and Facebook, and encouraging me to keep flying.











BOOK REVIEW


