

Much thanks to Mona who stepped in to handle the last few months' general meetings while I was evacuated from the CZU August Lightning Complex Fire. Some of what we have learned from this year's multiple hardship have also amplified our humanness. Pilots helped deliver needed medical supplies by the California Pilot Association and CalDART; members checked up on one another and offered any assistance they could; essential to our economy, flight schools were still open; pilots reported status of smoke and fire and assisted in whatever ways were needed; others helped make masks and PPE's. When the call goes out, people find a way to help.

Another fact that we recognized during the Coronavirus's social distancing and quarantining is that we are social beings. We want and eventually need to be around others. Even my nineteen-month old granddaughter gravitates to other youngsters at the park who look like her age. She wants to interact with others and so do we. That leads me to the next item. Our next general meeting will be October 21st (Wednesday) @ 6:30 p.m. at the EAA hangar. We will be having an in-person Halloween potluck. Aviation Emergency Go-Bag

When I received the order to evacuate from the CZU fire, I had a vague sense of what to pack and take with me. I thought I'd be back the next morning and basically took only one change of clothes. I have a checklist for overnight stays which I used but I was not planning on being away for more than a few days. I was evacuated for 21 days. I had to buy clothes for myself and my husband and I didn't have my computer. I did grab my flight bag that had my headphone and logbook in it. If you had to evacuate, do you have an aviation go-bag ready and do you have an evacuation checklist? It is times like this that make me reminisce and help me plan a better evacuation. Are you prepared? If, not, get started.

We're Seeking Kelp!

Northern California has lost an astonishing 90% of its kelp forest in just a few short years due to climate and other impacts. This fall, our colleagues at the <u>Greater Farallones Association</u> are mapping the extent of remaining kelp forests to <u>understand where recovery efforts should be focused</u>.

Pilots are in a unique position to help! Take photos of any kelp you see from your plane in September and October, and capture vital information from areas that are tough to reach from land. Just follow these three simple tips:

Capture the full extent of the kelp bed, if possible.

Record the location's GPS coordinates.

Make sure to fly above 1000' AGL to avoid impacting coastal wildlife.

Watsonville Municipal Airport...an Airport of Opportunity, an Airport of Service

Watsonville's Municipal Airport (KWVI), the only airport in Santa Cruz County, was highlighted as an "Airport of Opportunity" in the December 2018 issue of <u>Business View Magazine</u>. The article harkened back to the late 1920's when several hundred community members joined together to purchase eighty-five acres just outside of town to establish an airport. What many may not know is by 1939 the War Department selected a new location in Watsonville for a Navy Air Auxiliary Station (NAAS). NAAS Watsonville served as a Rigid Airship (Blimp) base and a training facility for fighter aircraft pilots assigned to the Pacific Theater during World War II.

In 1947 the three hundred thirty acre facility reverted to the City, with the caveat that it be operated as a civil airport in perpetuity. For the last seventy-three years Watsonville has done just that. In particular airport management has focused on the KWVI's vitality, viability, and value to the Community, City and County. Aviation utility has proved vital during the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake, but just as vital on a daily basis with professional pilots flying medical air ambulances and volunteer pilots flying Angel Flight and Los Medicos Voladores missions. Airport viability created \$67 million in total economic benefits in 2019. Last year Watsonville Airport provided over 450 jobs with a payroll of over \$27 million from on-field maintenance facilities, flight training operations, air taxi/charter flight services, thrill seeking aviation "adventures" and commercial business activities. Airport value to our community ranges from outreaches such as the annual July 4th Airport Open House (Fire-in-the-Sky) and monthly "Kids Fly Free!" events to on-field Red Cross Blood drives and serving as landlord to the 45 member unit of the California Conversation Corps. Watsonville Muni is in fact an airport of opportunity; however over the last few weeks our airport has demonstrated it is also an *Airport of Service*.

In mid-August the Airport received a request from CalFire to serve as a Helicopter Firefighting Attack Base ("Helitack Base") to combat the CZU-August Complex fire. On Sunday August 16th Watsonville Airport Operations activated an emergency aerial support protocol which dedicates a portion of the airport solely as an emergency operations area. The protocol supports not only aerial operations, but also ground activities: fueling, logistics, field access and security. Initially the Helitack Base consisted of two helicopters and support vehicles, but within twenty-four hours the number of aircraft expanded to seven helicopters, seven fuel tankers and associated support personnel and vehicles. During the week hundreds of water drop sorties were flown.

The following week the Municipal Airport received a request from the State Office of Emergency Services (OES) to provide support for helicopter survey operations over the CZU fire area. When ceiling and visibilities allow, overflight survey is key to assessing the size, scope and relative success of the firefighting effort. The State OES visit required our airport be prepared to logistically support the arrival and re-fueling of US Army and Air Force Blackhawk helicopters. Citizens may have seen these aircraft with their distinctive pink paint scheme highlights, which depict military aircraft operating as a public service. Two Blackhawk aircraft transported sixteen visitors to Watsonville including the State OES Director, representatives of Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and even a television film crew.

By the end of August, the Municipal Airport received two additional requests, one from the Governor's office and yet another from the California National Guard to provide logistical aircraft support. Substantial security measures were imposed during these visits. Watsonville's Airport Operations Center served as the briefing site for California's Governor, California's OES Director and the nation's FEMA's Administrator prior to inspecting the CZU's fire impact on Big Basin and also served as the arrival/departure point for a National Guard Two-star General to inspect the military's on-site support of the CalFire on-going operations.

The City's many departments serve not only our community members and citizens within the City limits, but reach beyond those limits to the county, the region and beyond. **KWVI**, an Airport of Opportunity and an Airport of Service.

B-25J—Old Glory crash

Crash of Old Glory the B-25 (Mitchell) WWII bomber

On September 19, 2020 at 6:22 p.m., Old Glory the World War II B-25J, made a forced landing just west of Stockton in a farmer's neatly manicured field. The emergency landing was to precision but during the landing roll out, the plane hit a large irrigation ditch, launched over it, tearing out both Wright radial engines (2600 twin row, 14 cylinders) and ending partially on the other side. It was dragged across to the empty field nearby where it was then examined and eventually dismantled.

This plane was made in 1944 and named "Mitchell" after General Billy Mitchell who advocated for greater airpower in the armed forces. The B-25's are one of America's most famous airplanes, used in WWII as a medium bomber, The plane was originally intended for level bombing from medium altitudes but it was used in the Pacific theater for bombing Japanese airfields and beach enplacements from treetop levels and for strafing and skip bombing enemy ships.

This B-25 was most active during World War II in Italy and the Mediterranean areas. Then from 1959 to 1965 it was a fire bomber; and in 1995, it became "Old Glory" and was seen in many airshows and fly-ins.

At the end of last month, the Mitchell and 13 other warbirds made fly-over tours in Hawaii to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the end of WWII. The planes were again crane-lifted onto a Navy amphibious assault ship and returned to San Diego. The B-25 planned to make a few more commemorative stops before returning to New York. The plane flew to Chino then to Nut Tree Airport (didn't refuel) and proceeded to the Stockton Airport for some maintenance. At 1300 feet AGL, both engines failed nearly at the same time.

Four days after the crash, I was able to see the plane first hand and my initial reaction was to cry, seeing this magnificent plane in the middle of a farmer's dirt field. The person dismantling the plane worked for the insurance company so I asked him what he thought the reason was for the crash. He said, "ran out of fuel." Knowing that the pilots of this plane were "type" rated and experience flying this plane, that explanation didn't make sense to me. Later I learned that the NTSB will be examining the fuel system and its status.

WOMEN IN FILM DALLAS AN-NOUNCES TOPAZ FILM FESTIVAL LINEUP



DALLAS, Texas, August 24, 2020: The Topaz Film Festival presented by Women in Film Dallas (WIFD) is proud to announce the 46 films chosen for the 2020 Festival. The festival is adding two days to it's calendar to accommodate an expanded lineup of 6 shorts blocks and 4 features.

In light of the circumstances surrounding COVID-19, the WIFD board of directors has decided to hold this year's festival on a virtual platform. The difficult decision was also made to postpone the Topaz Awards Brunch to a future time when "we feel it is safe for us to celebrate our female filmmakers and contributors in person," stated WIFD President Alicia Pascual.

This year, the festival will be held from September 8-13, 2020 through the Eventive virtual platform. Screenings will include short blocks in the following categories: Student, Texas, Comedy, Narrative and Animated/Experimental. All of these female-driven selections were curated from a large pool of submissions from across the nation and around the world. 
Movie Title: Rise Above: WASP
