

Question for the month of September: Why did I learn to fly?

After college I had a list of things I wanted to learn, such as archery and flying. After my first flying lesson, well, I just couldn't stop! —Gigi Adelman

When I was working for Longs, one of the sales representatives that I bought from took several of us up for lunch in Monterey and he said it was very easy to learn to fly. I had been sitting in the co-pilot's seat and we switched seats in mid-air and for the first time in my life, I was in control of an airplane (with guidance) and I thought it was so cool. A friend and I went to the Watsonville Fly-In & Air Show and met some pilots and they in turn took us up for a ride and that was it--I had to learn how to fly! —Laura Barnett

When I was a kid my dad would take all of us kids out to the airport and we would sit and watch the airplanes take off and land. At the time I didn't realize it was a way to get us all out of my mom's hair and I thoroughly enjoyed it. Then at 21, I had my first flight on a DC-9 from LAX to PDX. I was so enthralled that the day after I got home I called and checked on how much it would cost to learn to fly--\$900, they said. At the time that was way too much for me. Twenty-some years later I was finally able to follow through. And, it is even more fun than I imagined. —Donna Crane-Bailey

I remember as a small child watching squadrons of aircraft -- like 200 at a time -- on their way to the Pacific in WW II. I was probably 9 or 10. They amazed me! Then when I was 12, my family had a small ranch on Fairview Rd. in Hollister. The neighboring ranch had a small dirt strip, and I would walk through the orchard after school and watch the planes...and the person who was gassing the planes was my husband-to-be Ron! My first airplane ride was when I was 16, with Ron's dad at the Hollister airport open house. (He was the airport manager.) Then after we were married and raising a family, flying was NOT a part of our budget. But, in early 1970 Ron took up flying again, and I loved to be the co-pilot but would NOT touch the controls. One day he made an appointment at Air Trails for an introductory flight lesson, and like a dutiful wife I went out there, knowing that is as far as it would go. Well, I got hooked and 90 days later had my check ride with Jack Jella and... well, you know the rest of the story! —Kay Harmon

I learned to fly because I was afraid of flying commercial, and when my friend (who is a captain with Delta) took me flying in his C170A, I realized it was the most fun you could have with your clothes on!!

I happened across Amelia Earhart's books *Last Flight* and *The Fun of It*, and was blown away by her articulate advocacy for women's rights and capabilities. She was saying exactly what I needed to hear but had never been told before. I started reading everything I could find about her and other early women pilots. Naturally I had to learn to fly to be like those fantastic ladies. —Mona Kendrick

I had an interest to learn to fly after I saw the Blue Angels. I loved what they could do. And also because my Grandfather had an interest in them. I wish I could have taken him flying. —Michaele Serasio

I always loved flying in airplanes. (I'm one of those people who annoy others on commercial flights who like to watch movies because I keep my shade up so I can look out the window.) Knowing this, one of my daughters sent me *Inside the Sky* by William Langewiesche. Wednesday, September 16, 2008, 8:00 P.M., Monterey Bay 99s Speaker



LT Nicole Cabana, a pilot with National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Corps, will speak to the Monterey Bay Chapter about her experiences flying Twin Otters as a NOAA pilot as well as the NOAA mission. Nicole has a background in marine biology and geographic information systems along with her aviation interests. Nicole is currently on assignment in the Monterey Bay area and is a member of the Florida Suncoast Chapter of The Ninety-Nines.

The following brief introduction to NOAA comes from an article found on the internet. The men and women of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Corps, through a combination of operational, technical, scientific, and leadership skills, support NOAA's mission to assess, predict, and warn of changes in the global environment. NOAA is a civilian earth science agency with a small uniformed service. It has a multifaceted mission covering many science disciplines that affect Americans in a number of ways. Fifty percent of the nation's population lives along the coastlines, with a significant impact on coastal resources. Delicate coral reefs, source of

many of the world's critical bio-technical resources, must be protected from marine debris, ship traffic, and the bleaching effects of a warming ocean. Economically valuable species of fish as well as marine mammals require constant monitoring and protection to ensure sustainability. Port development and safe navigation are vital to coastal state economies and international trade. Global climate variability, which affects such things as the severity of a storm season, the growth of crops, and the availability of water resources, must be predicted accurately so its effects can be mitigated. Hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, and other severe weather must be forecast with enough advance warning to save the lives of those in their destructive paths. All of these duties and more fall within the scope of NOAA science.

Annual WRAP-PAC Dinner Speaker: Assemblywoman Anna Caballero

The annual Watsonville Regional Airport Promotion-PAC (WRAP-PAC) dinner will be held on **Saturday November 1**, at 6:30 p.m., at the Green Valley Grill, 40 Penny Lane, Watsonville. The speaker will be State Assemblymember Anna Caballero. The details of her speech are not known yet, but we suspect it will be about Watsonville Airport, controversial Senate Bill 1118 regarding Airport Land Use Commission (ALUC), and other related legislation.

It supports local candidates for the Watsonville City Council, County Board of Supervisors and other public offices, whose positions recognize the importance of Watsonville Airport as a regional asset. This year the PAC is more active than it has ever been in supporting candidates for the Watsonville City Council and Board of Supervisors. In the last election we made significant progress by supporting some really good pro-airport people who won that election. Watsonville Airport needs local representatives who will not try to convert a safe airport to an unsafe one.

The WRAP dinner gives you an opportunity to visit with Anna Caballero, members of the Watsonville City Council, County Supervisors, and several City Council candidates.

Bottom line—we need political progress. WRAP needs your support more than ever. The dinner will again be held at the Green Valley Grill where the food is great. There will be three dinner choices. You can choose one or all three.
