#### **FAA Transitions to ICAO Flight Plan Format**

Notice Number: NOTC9696

The FAA has transitioned to mandatory use of the international flight plan format for all IFR and VFR domestic and international civil flights, effective August 27 at 0500 EST. The change is part of an effort to modernize and streamline flight planning and supports the FAA's NextGen initiatives.

Benefits of the international form make it easier and more intuitive for pilots to use and will increase safety.

An increase in the size of the departure and destination fields to allow a greater variety of entry types, including Special Flight Rules Area (SFRA) flight plans

Transmission of the supplemental pilot data field, which contains pilot contact information, along with the VFR flight plan to the destination facility, to reduce search and rescue response times

Air traffic control gains access to detailed equipment codes to identify aircraft capability

The international format will also allow for integration of Performance Based Navigation (PBN) and enhance air traffic control services by allowing for easier identification of equipage, which can make greater use of airspace.

With the exception of military flight operations, the international format is required for all IFR and VFR flights across the NAS. Guidance on how to complete an international flight plan is available at <a href="www.faa.gov/go/flightservice">www.faa.gov/go/flightservice</a>.

## Woman becomes first female Marine to pilot F-35B fighter jet



A woman who attributes her success to "showing up prepared and working diligently" has become the first female Marine to pilot a F-35B fighter jet.

U.S. Marine Capt. Anneliese Satz, 29, of Boise, Idaho, completed the F-35B Basic Course on June 27, the Marine Corp announced in a press release last week.

Satz trained for four years, including in Corpus Christi, Texas, and Meridian, Mississippi, before arriving at Marine Corps Air Station in Beaufort, South Carolina, in July 2018. She took her first flight in the F-35B Lightning II Joint Strike Fighter, the first-ever supersonic short takeoff/vertical landing stealth aircraft, in October 2018.

The first flight was done solo — something that Satz said she was prepared for thanks to her training, which included practice time in simulators and written exams.

"The syllabus thoroughly prepares you for that first time you take off and for every flight after that, it's an exhilarating experience," she said in the press release.

The Marines said Satz, who has more than 300 flight hours, will now join a unit called the Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 121, the Green Knights in Iwakuni, Japan.

Before joining the Marines, Satz was a commercial pilot flying helicopters. She said her helicopter piloting and training schools helped her live up to her potential.

"At each of my training schools I did my best," Satz said. "I truly believe that showing up prepared and working diligently are two major keys to success."

The aircraft Satz will be flying is designed to take off and land from areas with small runway spaces, including flight decks, that operate close to front-line combat zones.

Satz is a graduate of Boise State University, according to NBC affiliate KTVB in Boise. Her milestone comes 24 years after the Marine Corps got its first female aviator, then-2nd Lt. Sarah Deal, reported Military.com.

## **Michaele Reporting on AirVenture**

This was my first time at the EAA AirVenture in Oshkosh, Wisconsin!!

After a delayed then cancelled flight from Dayton, Ohio where I was for the 99s International Conference, I finally got there. Three of us 99s (Karen Hausteen, D. Maria Lamia and I) rented a car and drove from Chicago to Wisconsin where Maria lives and then Karen and I drove up further to Appleton, Wisconsin where our housing was at Lawrence University (Dorms). So we started out on Tuesday. Tip: get the week's worth of parking pass and the EAA AirVenture for the week ahead of time to make things quick.

Another tip is to try and get to the Wittman Airport before 7am. You can eat your breakfast in the car or buy on the grounds. Tip: figure out a way to know where you parked your Rental car!! It is very hard to find in the dark!!

EAA AirVenture was very overwhelming at first. They have a daily newspaper that has the classes for the day (you can also order the Souvenir program ahead of time and pick up at the event).

Karen and I spoke to a man handing out the daily papers and maps. Very helpful volunteers all throughout the event. Initially we just walked around in a daze!! Later we went through some Large Hangars A, B, C, D where people are selling or promoting everything Aviation. Around a corner is an area that is like a flea market (fly market) where people who are camping could get whatever they forgot.

We connected with Karen's friends and mine (Jim Shumaker, Tom Jones, Petra Kirk, 99s gals and Sophia Taylor-Home). We would meet then do our own things and then meet again to watch the Airshows.

Redbird, Cessna, Ford, anything and everything you could possibly imagine was at this event!!! Of course EAA provided classes and I took one on L o s s of Control (Spins) with Judy Phelps [Ventura 99]. It provided Wings Credit.

People were very nice and the event was sooo clean. Enough Porta-potties and real bathrooms. They had scooters, wagons for rent. I recommend bringing a small fold up chair, cart, blanket/towel to sit on for the daily Airshow at 2:30pm. (Take a nap on the grass!) I brought a backpack but that got heavy with Souvenirs, give always and Poncho. You can bring your own drinks and lunch/snacks. They have water fountains to re-fill your water bottles. Don't forget the usual Sunscreen, neckerchief (wet down to keep cool) and hat. Watch yourself as the heat and humidity can lead to heat stroke if you are not hydrated and cooled. I found myself feeling weak and sick. The Hangars and buildings are air-conditioned. Wear good walking shoes! I averaged 12,000 steps every day!!

The Night airshow with Fireworks was out of this world!!!! I have NEVER seen any fireworks like they had. All the airplanes that performed had special lighting on their aircraft and shot fireworks from their airplanes!! Also it seemed that the performers on the daily airshow and nighttime ones would perform their act for twice as long as we see at SNS.

Some performers that we all know: Julie Clark, Sean D. Tucker and Jessy, Gene Soucy, Shockwave Truck Red Bull Helicopter and more.

I went to the Seaplane Park by a shuttle (\$3.00) and well worth the trip! Sooo peaceful! I also went to the EAA Museum by shuttle. I have a new respect for what the EAA

provides for Aviators of all levels and the Aviation community. Lots of Aircraft and tributes to women and men in Aviation.

I felt like I was able to cover the whole thing in 4 days. I only took one class which if you were wanting more education/safety would take much more time.



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
