



My Flying Career

My interest began just after WW II. Living in rural Fairview District in Hollister, I loved to walk through the orchard to the neighbor's field. Elmer Harmon, who was my future father-in-law, had a small strip and he would give lessons under the GI Bill, rides, etc. That is where I first met my best friend, Ron. The Harmon's later moved their flight school to the Hollister Airport, and Mr. Harmon became the Airport Manager after the Navy evacuated that airfield.

Ron achieved his license at age 17, and I flew with him before we got married, and then we started raising a family. When Ron started flying again, I became his fair-weather companion, not wanting to take controls, but enjoying charts, navigating, changing frequencies, etc. Unbeknownst to me, Ron wanted to buy an airplane. One day he informed me he had made an appointment for me with Air Trails for an introductory flight lesson, which I reluctantly did. That was June 1st, 1971. Well, that was all it took. I got my confidence and came back to our office with all of the needed manuals to get started. Solo came on June 15th, 1971, and Private on August 30th, 1971.

Then came our first airplane. In 1971 we purchased a 1958 C172 Skyhawk, which we lovingly dubbed The SuperChicken. We flew the PAR (Pacific Air Race) in 1973 with daughter Dianne (she got her license while a senior in high school), placed 19th out of 99 teams and got trophies for best score for first time racers. Flew the PAR solo in 1975, fun but no trophy. Flew His 'n Hers Great Pumpkin Classic Air Race twice, with Ron -- placed 4th and 10th. Then just worked on the race as timer and handicapper. More Fun! As a side note: when daughter Dianne got her license, Ron made the statement: "Now I have my choice of right or left seat, as long as it's in the back!"


- 99s offices held: Vice Chair, Chapter Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, APT chair. Also Chapter Pilot of the Year in 1973.
- Salinas Airport Commission: Appointed in 1988, through 1993, then again in 1995 through 2002. Served as Chairman twice, Vice Chairman twice.
- SOPA - Charter member and board of directors, Vice Pres., Secretary, Treasurer.
- Airport tour guide for Monterey County Lyceum for 5 years. Airport tour guide for numerous school and Boy and Girl Scout groups.
- Aviation informative talks to Kiwanis Club, Lyons Club and SIRS.

Aircraft checked out: Grumman T-cat, Tiger and American, Cherokee 140, 150, 180, Archer, Arrow, Cherokee 6-260 and 300, Cessna 150, 172, Hawk X-P, 182, Citabria, Taylorcraft L-2 WW II reconnaissance aircraft, Corbin Baby-Ace, a parasol-wing solo homebuilt. Left seat time in Thorpe T-18, another homebuilt; as well as Beachcraft B model, Mooney, Comanche 260 and Navion. Also, have right seat time in Cessna Concourse and Douglas DC-3.

Have flown into British Columbia, all Western States, and to Kansas to pick up first new plane, the Hawk X-P at the factory, purchased two aircraft in San Marcos, TX and flew them back side by side. Love to air-plane camp in spots like Columbia and also at a forestry strip at 8,500' near Mt. Whitney.

Flight time logged: 2,200 plus hours.
